SOIL VAPOR EXTRACTION PILOT TEST BEGINS AT THE FIRE STATION TODAY. The

water table has dropped 3 feet since installation of the test equipment back in April. Last week John Henry from O'Reilly Talbot and Okun came out to check water levels and verified that contaminated soils are now exposed. A quick test of their system drew that familiar stench of gasoline from. Today all the monitors are getting hooked up to the test wells and data collection will begin. There are two 1000 pound carbon filter filled barrels that will collect the contamination from the vapors. This test phase will be analyzed to determine if this method is worth pursuing and help us understand the magnitude of the problem under the building.

John Henry will be figuring the "radius of influence" using .1" vacuum or greater as an indicator of sufficient draw. The wells that are in might be sufficient or they may need to input other wells at different locations and or at a smaller radius to the main well they are pulling off of in the Rescue Bay. Matting was used to close off a vent, increase the vacuum near the main test well in the rescue bay. A practice dummy oversees the test area.



REP. KULIK AND SEN. ROSENBERG VISIT SHUTESBURY FOR A 5 TOWN MEETING last Friday. The twenty one folks that gathered included our Union 28 Superintendent, Town Counsel, Selectboard and School Committee members, Treasurers, Town Administrators, and Sen. Rosenberg's staff member, Mark Dailey, who organized the event. The subject of discussion was how the three towns, Shutesbury, Leverett and Erving, and New Salem/Wendell school district could enact an agreement that they have reached regarding the apportionment of costs for healthcare benefits for the Union 28 Administrative staff. The Mass General Law authorizing health insurance, chapter 32B, treats union superintendency unions differently then it treats regional school districts. Union superintendency unions are not a body politic. A regional school district can make its own determination. In a union the "lead town" principle applies. That means whichever community has the largest school population sets the rate of health insurance paid by all the communities. Currently that is Erving. What the governing units want to achieve is payment of Union 28 employees of the same rates that each town pays all their other employees. A local option needs to be added to the chapter 32B legislation regarding "lead town" for this to be allowed. Draft language was written at the meeting that Sen. Rosenberg and Rep. Kulik are taking back to their respective House and Senate counsels for review. They will then bring the local option to committee and try to get it legislated for us. Until the legislation is achieved, Shutesbury will continue to follow 32B requirements for paying at the lead town rates. Great appreciation goes out to our legislators for pursuing a solution to this problem that has existed for many years.

ENERGY PROGRAMS AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC I just want to clarify that the Green Community funds available to Shutesbury are for town building projects.
